

REFERENCES THAT LORD IS BAAL

- 1) Baal –literal meaning: “Lord.” (**Oxford Dictionary of World Mythology**, by Arthur Cotterel, page 21)
- 2) Lord –is the translation of two Hebrew words : “baal” and “adon”. (**Biblical Dictionary and Concordance of the new American Bible**, page 127)
- 3) Baal –(Hebrew “baal”, Lord) –one of numerous local gods among ancient Phoenicians and Canaanites. (**The Scriber Bantam English Dictionary**)
- 4) The word “Baal” means Lord (**The Illuminate 666**, by William Josiah Sutton, page 98)
- 5) “Baal” as we have seen signified “The Lord”. (**The Two Babylons**, by Alexander Hislop, page 26)
- 6) Baal –(Lord, possessor, husband) 1. Appears in the Old Testament with a variety of meanings: **master** or **owner** (Judges 19:22 and Exodus 21:28, 34), **husband** (Exodus 21:3 and II Samuel 11:26) 2. Usually, however it refers to farm god of the Phoenicians and Canaanites, responsible for the crops, flocks, fecund farm families. Its locality had its own Baal. (**Handy Dictionary of the Bible**, edited by Merrill C. Tenny, copyright 1965 by Zondervan Publishing House, Grand Rapids, Michigan)
- 7) Baal –The Hebrew noun ba’al means master, possessor or husband... In general, Baal is a proper name in the Old Testament and refers to a specific deity, Hadad, the Western Semitic storm-god, the most important deity in the Canaanite pantheon. (**New Bible Dictionary**, 2nd edition, p. 109)
- 8) Baal –means “my Lord” in Hosea 2:16 (**King James Version Bible and Companion Bible** footnotes and center column references)

REFERENCES THAT GOD COMES FROM

GAD, GUD, GOTH, GOTT

- 1) GOD –common Teutonic word for personal object of religious worship, formerly **applicable to super-human beings of heathen myth; on conversion of Teutonic races to Christianity, term was applied to Supreme Being**. (*Encyclopedia Americana*, 1945 edition, under topic “GOD”).
- 2) Gad – a Canaanite god of fortune, Joshua 11:17, 12:7, 13:5, 15:37 (**Handy Dictionary of the Bible**, edited by Merrill C. Tenny, copyright 1965, by Zondervan Publishing House, Grand Rapids, Michigan).
- 3) Baal–gad = “God is Baal”, Joshua 11:17, 12:7, 13:5 (Ibid)

- 4) Gad – **a pagan deity worshipped by the Canaanites as the god of Fortune** for whom they prepare a table in Isaiah 65:11. (**New Bible Dictionary**, 2nd edition, p. 398)
- 5) Gad – **a deity (or spirit) of fortune** mentioned in Isaiah 65:11 as being worshipped, along with **Meni** (a god of fate or destiny), by apostate Jews, probably in post-exilic Judah. (**The Anchor Bible Dictionary**, Volume II, p. 863)
- 6) Gad –means ... **a Babylonian deity of fortune** (**Strong’s Hebrew and Chaldee Dictionary**, No. 1409)
- 7) “Further research revealed that the Teutonic “Druids” called the sun “Gud”, “Gudh”, “Goth” or “GOTT”. In Sweden, Finland and other nearby lands, they still call the sun “GOTT” in everyday speech. (**Fossilized Customs**, 2nd edition by *Lew White*, page 18)
